Archon's Address

The year 2003 was a prosperous one for the Zeta; it was a year of goals set and expectations exceeded both by the Fraternity as a whole and individual brothers. A year ago, the Zeta trustees came to Hanover to discuss the beginning of a multi-tiered approach toward renovating the House in response to the mandatory requirements over 5 to 10 years specified by the physical audit commissioned by the College several years ago. Thanks in large part to architect Scott Simon '76 and Bob and Evelyn Kaiser, we were able to complete the first major project this past summer. The front of the House now boasts new bluestone walkways, a handicap ramp beautifully infused with a new barbecue grill, and a completely refinished entryway and door that now make Psi Upsilon one of the most elegant houses on campus.

In conjunction with our efforts to refurbish the physical appearance of the House we are also trying to improve Psi Upsilon's image both on campus and in the community. Over the summer the sophomores worked hard to promote many social and charitable events, not the least of which was a benefit concert held on the front lawn in which they raised nearly \$600 for the WISE foundation. We continue to cook weekly dinners for the Edgerton Christian House in Hanover, and our philanthropy projects have made Psi Upsilon a major contributor to the Hanover community. In the fall of 2003 we initiated a gift matching system through the Inter Fraternity Council in which, with the participation of all the fraternities on campus, the IFC was able

to raise \$2300 for the United Way of the Upper Valley.

Academically the Zeta continues to thrive in an increasingly competitive environment here at Dartmouth. This summer, at the 160th Psi U Convention, delegates Tim Millikin '05 and Brad Crispin '05 were proud to accept the Garnet & Gold Award, an accolade given to those chapters which hold an exemplary GPA within their academic communities. Ted Knudsen '04 continues to shine, as he was one of 26 members of the class of 2004 to be inducted early into the Phi Beta Kappa honor society. Having been a Rufus Choate Scholar during his junior year, Ted is considered to be the link in the lineage between fellow Phi Beta Kappa Jamie Smith '03 and this year's Rufus Choate Scholar and incoming Vice President Cam Fortin '05.

In addition to these exemplary efforts, many Zeta brothers have taken advantage of Dartmouth's unique calendar year to pursue foreign enrichment programs. Scott Linthicum '04 and Aidan Donahue '04 studied at the London School of Economics during the summer of 2003; following them in the fall were Fortin '05, Steve Joseph '05 and Sourav Chaudhuri '05, who spent their terms in the United Kingdom studying at Oxford University alongside recent graduates Smith '03 and Watt Boone '00.

Athletics continue to be a key focus of the Zeta, as we have representatives on an unprecedented 8 varsity and club sports teams. Vice President Ryan Goldhahn '04 and Matt Derr '04 served as captains of the Water Polo team and led this year's squad to the National Tournament at Texas Tech. This fall All-

American Scott Hogan '04 captained the Sailing Team to its first number one ranking in 4 years and hopes to challenge for the National Championship this spring. Goldhahn '04 also doubles as captain of the Swimming Team, which has secured its best record in over 20 years. Aidan Donahue '04 and juniors Will Hiltz '05 and Cam Fortin '05 led Dartmouth Squash to number 5 in the nation; fellow junior Mike Liddy '05 helped the Men's Basketball team topple Harvard this season. John Hertzler '04 is this year's Men's Lightweight Crew captain and has established himself as one of the premier rowers in college ranks. Hertzler has his sights set on the US National Rowing Team this summer and hopes to make a bid at the Olympics in 2008. The bright prospects in the incoming pledge class are twin brothers Erik and Karl Johnson, both bivarsity athletes in sailing and alpine skiing. Look for Karl at the US Nationals this winter in the Giant Slalom.

This year marks the fourth year of the Student Life Initiative, a program entered into by the College in which, amongst other things, Greek rush was moved to Sophomore Winter instead of Sophomore Fall in 2001. Dean James Larimore proclaimed that winter term

The team went 2-2 at the national championships with victories over Western Illinois and Colgate.

Brothers Aidan Donahue, Will Hiltz, and Cam Fortin continue to lead the top-10-ranked Men's Squash Team into another winter with national title implications. Fortin even took his game international this past fall while studying at Oxford University. He competed for the Oxford Blues before abandoning the team just before their match with arch-rival Cambridge.

Greg McSweeney concluded a highly-successful career as captain of the



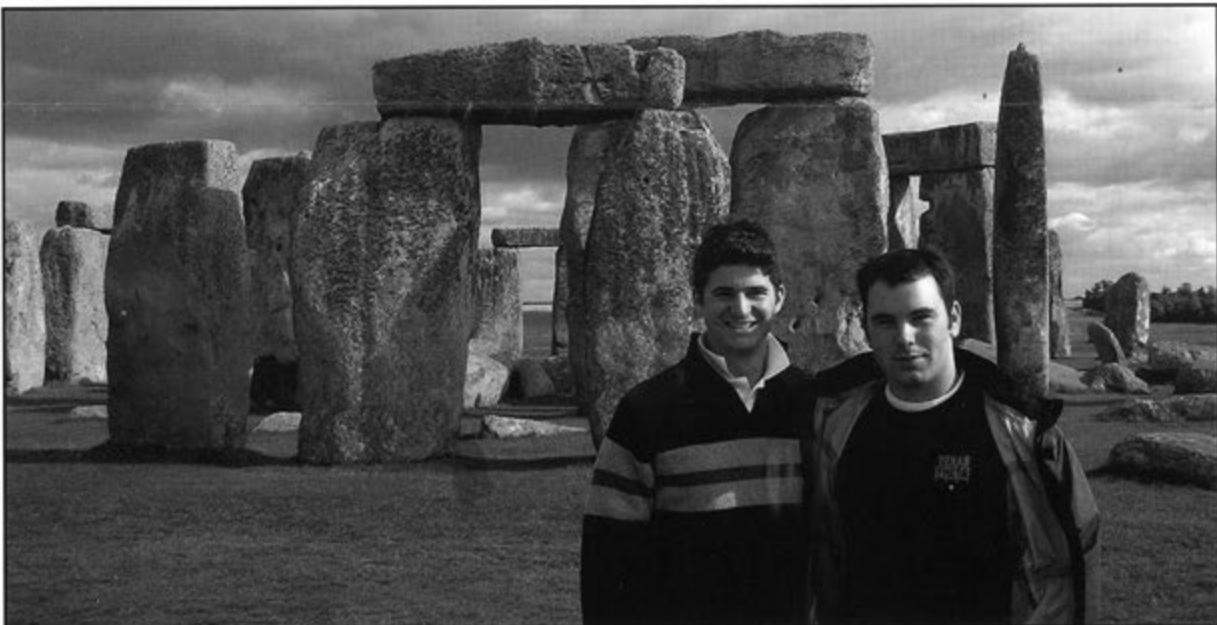

State of the House

As the Psi Upsilon House reaches its 63rd year since it's rebuilding, things are looking better and better. New bluestone walkways, building up of the front lawn, in addition to a mandated concrete and stone handicap ramp, a handsome new barbecue grill and a completely renovated front entry way have changed the look of 7 West Wheelock for the better. Many of us had been concerned about this facelift, but despite the loss of the white pine on the south lawn, the new look has been a great gain for the House.

The interior has also seen improvements. We have recently refinished the hardwood floors in the living room and front hall, and new carpet has been laid in the upstairs hallways and Chapter Room. Although our funds have been somewhat short, the House Treasurer and I managed to scrape enough money together to buy a new custom-built study table for the Chapter Room, complete with Dartmouth and Psi U emblems inlaid in the top. Additionally, we have installed new fire-resistant doors for all bedrooms to comply with the fire code.

Overall, the House has managed to withstand the tests of long time and hard use very well. We intend to repaint the House exterior this coming spring or summer, as well as several interior rooms, including the card room and the "gym" bedroom. Hopefully, we also may be able to undertake another major project required by the recent physical facilities audit.

I would like to extend the Chapter's and my personal thanks to the Zeta Association and the many alumni brothers who have provided so substantially for the funding of these never-ending House improvement projects.
